Pilgrim Lutheran School Home of the Wildcats

School Subjects (Principal Chris Comella)



Parents of current Pilgrim school students received this enews a couple of weeks ago, but for those of you who are not current parents, here are some things that are happening at Pilgrim School.

The teachers, the Board of Education, and the Church Council have all been talking about our visions for making Pilgrim a stronger place, more responsive to the needs of all our students and their families. Here is a report of what is going on in these groups.

Staff: Teachers have been looking hard at what we teach and how we teach it. We have set some achievable goals for change in the next year. In the area of core academic subjects, we plan to ensure that each grade level cohort of students has a reading class with only that grade level. Currently, some 5th graders have reading with 6th graders and some 5th graders have reading with 4th graders. We are mapping a schedule that would be similar to the lower grades in which students are only with their own grade level. This would also be true for Spanish instruction. Grade level cohorts would allow for more flexible groups and for more enrichment activities. We are also currently investigating using some on-line enrichment activities linked to the MAP test and those offered through Northwestern University Center for Gifted and Talented. In addition, we are investigating the use of co-teaching, that is, two teachers in one class, to address special education needs. We are currently doing this on limited basis, but we would like to expand this.

Staff has also started to develop a plan to revise the Christian education curriculum to reflect the positive and affirming beliefs of our Bible-based tradition. We also want our service projects to be extensions of each homeroom's Christian education program, rather than clustering half-dozen costly appeals to whole school in November and December. For example, the appeal for the Friendship Center would only be the work of one homeroom. We want the focus of our service projects to be student involvement and relationship building, rather than parents merely spending extra in a trip to the grocery store.

BOE: The Board of Education is looking at some longer range strategic planning for the school, which is going to tie into the Evangelical Lutheran Education Association (ELEA) accreditation process in which the school is engaging. Currently, we are forming four groups focused on Building Use, Technology, Ministry, and Academics. If you have suggestions as to how we can improve our school in any of these areas, please let me or Nancy Liljedahl, BOE Chair, know. We are happy to discuss your ideas.

<u>Church Council</u>: The welfare of the school is a regular discussion at Church Council meetings. One initiative approved by Council and the Congregation has established The Dave Maring School Endowment Fund. The interest/dividend income from this fund would benefit the school in a variety of ways, but especially financial aid to families. Currently, we have a challenge from the Satter Family; they will match any donation to the School Endowment Fund up to \$25,000. This is an outstanding challenge and gift for the school. If you would like more information, please contact Pastor Kristian or me.

The Church Council has also authorized a Task Force to investigate the possibility of expanding our Pre-School Program to a satellite site at Luther Memorial Church, at Wilson and Campbell Avenues. The plan would be to open a mixed 3 & 4 year old class. The Task Force at this point has seen Luther's site and sees this as a joint ministry for the two congregations. The Task Force is starting the process of a needs assessment for this growth opportunity, and with CPS closing all of its pre-Kindergarten programs the need may be great. I will keep you all informed as to the progress of this investigation.

Finally, no matter what we plan to do, we are still in many ways bound to the world around us. CPS announced a while ago that they are changing the testing required for selective enrollment, IB and honors programs in their high schools.

While CPS continues to ponder what to do, we are preparing our students the best we can for whatever CPS wants. The Measure of Academic Progress (MAP) test is likely to replace Stanfords next year as our test not only to show student growth, but also to show student ranking in comparison to other students nationally in each respective grade level. The Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA), which developed and owns MAP, is upgrading Pilgrim's version of the test to reflect the new Common Core State Standards. NWEA has promised these upgrades by the end of June. We are also pursuing more MAP in-service for staff and the purchase of companion programs to MAP that can provide students with enrichment activities linked to their individual scores. These companion programs can be accessed via the web so students may work on them at school or at home. I will send more information when these are in place.

And a last word of thanks to all of you who donated to the Fund-A-Need at the Auction. The Pre-Kindergarten room has its new water table, the Kindergarten room has its new chairs, and sometime before the end of the school year, each classroom will have new window shades to allow for more effective use of technology. If there is still money in the Fund-A-Need account, our next projects are replacement of carpet and the movement of our technology off the server and into the Cloud. Congratulations to all our school families and the members of the Pilgrim Congregation who have worked so hard to pay for these improvements. God blesses this school and all its students through your generosity.

So, this is a window into some of the things happening at Pilgrim in addition to the rigorous academics, sports, social events, and ministry. Always, feel free to ask me anything about what is going on so that we can better educate our students to become the leaders of tomorrow. Blessings to all.
