A Testimony From The Great Banquet Retreat

Last weekend I spent three days and evenings gaining a better understanding of God's grace. I attended a retreat called The Greater Chicago Great Banquet in Park Ridge. There were many women there from many different places and of many different Christian faiths. At first, I wasn't sure why I was going; I just knew that I needed to attend.

Having gone to church since infancy, I thought I understood grace. It's the unwarranted love and favor of God toward us. It's endless in time and depth. To me it's like being a parent who loves her children completely and so deeply that even if they do awful things, she still loves them, something probably unimaginable until one has children of his or her own.

That's what God's love is toward us. Isaiah wrote about all the ways the Israelites went against God (we and they do have freewill). They angered Him and He punished them, BUT HE NEVER GAVE UP ON THEM. He always continued to love them like He does us.

In 1Corinthians 13:4-7 Paul wrote that: "Love is patient, love is kind; love is not envious or boastful, arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing but rejoices in truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, and endures all things."





That covers a lot, but nothing exceeds John 3:16; "For God so love the world that He gave His only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him may not perish, but may have eternal life." It's there for the taking.

I know that and accepted it, I thought. What I realized last weekend was that we don't really completely accept that God loves and forgives us until we are able to forgive ourselves. Until we do that, we are not able to live out our faith.

Due to some unexpected changes in circumstances I had become afraid to do many things because I was afraid I would fail. However, in 1Corinthians 12:4-11, God says that we all have spiritual gifts. But we can't discover them if we're mired down in beating ourselves up because we're not good enough in our own eyes.

God calls us to live a life of grace. If we worry that we can't be disciples, we must remember that God doesn't call those who are equipped; He equips those whom He calls.

Last weekend people expressed so much love toward the retreat participants in so many ways. There were so many demonstration of God's overwhelming love.

In Philippians 3:L3-1.4 Paul wrote "...forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Jesus Christ." The grace shown me during that weekend has left me better prepared to press on despite my shortcomings.


