El Salvador Mission Trip



Thank you for your prayers and support as Pastors Kristian and Anna-Kari are traveling to El Salvador to lead a mission trip with 36 participants July 31st-August 10th. The impact Pilgrim has had on the ministry of the Lutheran Church of El Salvador is absolutely extraordinary! Thanks to Pilgrim's generosity, 15 homes and churches have received solar electricity systems. Youth who could be on the streets are instead in school through our "Building Futures" Student Sponsorship Program. Youth concerned about hunger here in Chicago (the Homeland Helpers at Lane Tech) are extending their ministry to the Hope House ministry of El Salvador, and thanks to a generous donation from a Pilgrim school family, we are bringing a check for \$10,000 to help establish a coop farm, church, and youth center in the community of Colon, an area heavily challenged by poverty and violence. Please pray for safe travels and maximum kingdom impact! Pastor Kristian and others will be back on Sunday, August 16th.

New Administration Staff Alignment

Summer is a time for change and renewal at Pilgrim. With the departure of Ellen Twohig from our staff to pursue other opportunities, we have realigned our administrative positions to provide better stewardship of our resources. Instead of the two 4/5ths positions of Church Office Manager and School Office Operations Manager, Pilgrim Congregational Council has approved the creation of a full-time position of "Business Manager" to streamline the financial administration tasks that were split between the school office and the church office and the creation of two part-time positions of Communications Administrator and Office Administrator.

We are glad to announce that all three of these positions are now filled. Each of these people will help strengthen our work as Pilgrim Lutheran Church and School. Our Church Office Manager, **Lindsay Beveridge** (formally Lindsay White, but now happily married to husband Brian) was willing to take on the position of Business Manager, effective June 1st, 2015. She continues to work in the office opposite Pastor's Office.

Halley Williams is filling the new position of Communications Administrator. She is a dedicated school parent and church member, and has an extensive background in administration, including managing the Counseling Center of Lakeview for over 10 years. She is married to Glenn, and mother to Aidan (entering 4th grade) and Abigail (entering 1st grade). Halley will be coordinating our communications and calendars, as well as assisting Principal Comella on many school tasks, especially those tasks involving our Student Information System (SIS). Halley will be working mornings.

Kathy Danner is beginning work as our Office Administrator. Kathy is a dedicated church member who lives a few doors down on Winchester and is active in our prayer ministry. She recently retired from working at the Institute of Food Technologists for over 10 years, most recently as Exhibits Manager. Kathy is assuming the responsibilities that Lindsay formerly fulfilled related to church administration, most principally production of the worship bulletins and assisting with church mailings, etc. Kathy is responsible for answering phones and doors in the afternoons.

Both Halley and Kathy will both be stationed in the school office during school hours.

Earlier this year, thanks to answered prayers and the generosity of all of you, Pilgrim welcomed the family of Lutheran Ethiopian Pastor Lalissa Gemechis to Pilgrim! Pastor Lalissa's wife, Bilisie, and their son Homey (age 7) and daughter Wada (age 3) have been staying with Pastors Kristian and Anna-Kari and family in the Parsonage. Homey and Wada attended Pilgrim Lutheran School.

Pastor Lalissa has been working toward a PhD in Missiology at Concordia Seminary in Fort Wayne, Indiana, preparing to become a lead Pastor in one of the fastest growing churches in the world, the Mekane Yesus (Lutheran) Church of Ethiopia. They have grown in membership from 22,000 to 6.2 million over the past 50 years.

Bilisie is a long time leader in the Mekane Yesus ("the Dwelling Place of Jesus") Church of Ethiopia. She has been working out of the church office approximately 15 hours a week, with the primary responsibilities of Grant Writing and Alumni Relations.

School Subjects

School is quiet now. Teachers, students and their families are traveling far and wide, getting some much deserved rest and relaxation. At our last chapel of the school year, Pastor Kristian commissioned everyone to document the places they go by bringing along "Flat Jesus" and including him in their vacation photos. We are all looking forward to a review at the start of school of all the places we have been!

The Spring Semester at Pilgrim was indeed a very busy one! Here are some of the highlights:

Six of our fourteen 8th Graders applied to CPS Selective Enrollment High Schools and all of them were accepted. This is a remarkable feat! (Schools with three or four times our size do not usually place this many students in selective enrollment.) Of the other eight, two were accepted to competitive programs at Von Steuben High School, four were accepted into Catholic high schools, and two will be attending suburban public high schools.



The Lower Grades presented this year's operetta, *Going Buggy!* Many kudos are due to the Lower Grade teachers, parents and, of course, our student singers and actors for a wonderful job!

Elizabeth Eaton, the presiding bishop of the ELCA, came to visit Pilgrim School and the Student Council presented her with a check for \$2500 for use by the ELCA World Hunger Campaign.



The ELCA Schools Accreditation Team paid Pilgrim a visit. This happens once every seven years and provides our school community with an opportunity for both self-evaluation and outside critique so that we can develop a plan for school improvement. After eighteen months of preparation by the teachers, the Board of Education and Congregational Council, the Accreditation Team renewed Pilgrim's accreditation and cited our school for nine commendations in the areas of academic excellence, school leadership, and commitment by the congregation to support the school. This number of commendations is extraordinary and really does underscore the excellence of our school.

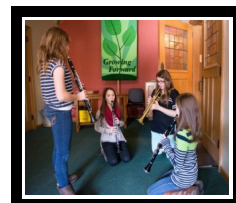
Pilgrim Sports teams had an outstanding year. Almost every upper grade student competed during the year in interscholastic sports. The 7th/8th Grade Boys Basketball Team played in the Chicago Lutheran Schools League (LSL) championships, and two 8th graders on the Track Team qualified for the LSL State Tournament at Concordia University. At the Pilgrim Sports Assembly on June 5, special recognition was given to Megan Zegler as the Anne Barsano Sports Volunteer of the Year Award Winner. Super Special Recognition went to Audrey Howaniec, who received the Mike Suhajda Sports Award for 2015. Audrey played volleyball, basketball, and ran cross country and track. In track she advanced to be one of the top runners in the State. (continued...)





Pilgrim also has stayed focused on the value of service to the school and to the community. At the Pilgrim Honors Assembly, Monday June 8. Three students qualified for the Pilgrim Service Hall of Fame: Hayden Kipp with 102 pts.; Beth Gillespie with 104 pts.; and Kevin Zegler with 134 pts. Their pictures and their point totals will be displayed with the other 69 Hall of Famers in the school office.

Pilgrim recognized the student who demonstrated excellence in all areas of student life. The Kiehm Award, which recognizes the 8th grader with the highest overall point total in the area of service, music, sports and academics, went to Addie Schlensker, with 1014.33 pts. Addie's photo and points will be added to the composite of Kiehm winners in the school office.



The Fabulous and Amazing Homeland Helpers from Lane Tech



On Saturday, last October 4th in Welles Park, two students from Lane Tech approached Pastor Kristian as he was preparing to co-lead a pet blessing. They said they had just started a club called "**The Homeland Helpers**" for students of Lane Tech to serve among the homeless. Pastor Kristian invited them to visit the Hot Meals program on Saturdays at Pilgrim at 11:30 AM. They came with a group of their friends the next week (October 11th) and have not missed a week since! In November, they asked each Hot Meals guest on two consecutive Saturdays what they would like to get for Christmas, up to \$25. On Saturday, December 21st, they distributed gifts to 51 guests, and we fed 58! As youth concerned about hunger here in Chicago, The Homeland Helpers at Lane Tech have extended their ministry and will travel with us to the Hope House ministry of El Salvador.

Thanks

to all the families and friends of Pilgrim who have given their money, their time and their good wishes to the Pilgrim Playground Project! We have raised over \$34,000 toward Phase 1 of the Playground renovation. The WeRaise crowdfunding campaign exceeded our target and we raised over \$10,000 to add to the \$14,900 raised at the auction and another \$9,000 raised through direct donations, the Popsicle event, and Chicago Pizza fundraiser. Phase 1 is the most difficult because the committee not only does demolition of the current surface, but must also lay the groundwork for the next two phases in Summer 2016 and 2017. We are looking to have all the phase 1 work done this August so that our students may return to a whole new look behind the teacherages at 4310 and 4314 North Winchester. Our budget is very tight, so if you still would like to make a donation to the project, please drop off a check in the school office. Work began on July 27. We are planning a Thank You Party for August 31. If you have any questions, please contact Tricia Koning Llewellyn or me.

Two other summer projects have been completed, as part of the Pilgrim Church Congregation's Capital Campaign. Immediately after school let out, work began to replace the school roof. While most of you may not notice a difference, the new roof ensures that school is dry and warm throughout the year. The other project was the replacement of classroom carpeting. Because of substantial savings on the roof project, the Pilgrim Church Council approved the expenditure of new carpet tiles for the school. Dave Emery, our Facilities Manager, and a Lutheran youth group called UKANDU exceeded this summer's goal to replace carpet in three classrooms, and they have, in fact, replaced carpet in all seven homerooms. New carpet will make our classrooms safer, cleaner, and more attractive.

Pilgrim has also hosted some very successful summer programs for children. In addition to Vacation Bible School, Arlene Calderone, who runs our Pilgrim After School (PAS) program during the school year, hosted students for three weeks this summer to explore life under the sea, the secret life of bugs and the mysteries of the garden. About fifteen children, ages 4-9, attended each week. The children enjoyed games, crafts and trips to the Shedd Aquarium and Field Museum. We hope that the success of the program this summer will help us to expand to more weeks next summer.

Finally, the end of the school year is time of major transition in schools. As the job and housing markets have opened up over the last couple of years, several families have moved to the suburbs or out of state. This year we also say good-bye to classmates and friends whose families have discerned that the Pilgrim part of their education has come to an end so that their child can take a place in a CPS school. We wish our best to each and every one of you! And if your path leads you back to this place, know that you are always welcome here!

In addition to students, two staff members have also announced that they will be making a transition to other callings this summer. Mrs. Twohig left the School Office on June 10, and Mrs. Saiki departed on June 12 after almost 30 years of service to Pilgrim. Both have shared many gifts with Pilgrim, and both will be missed. We wish many blessings on both Mrs. Twohig and Mrs. Saiki as they pursue their new callings.

Pilgrim BOE is looking for three new members and a new Board Chair. Two members are retiring from the Board and one is moving out of the City. Nancy Liljedahl is stepping down from the Chair at the end of her current two-year term. Many thanks to Nancy, to Stephanie Weber, to Marcia Frellick and to Lara Otsuka for their service to the Board and to Pilgrim overall!

Dining Reviews

EDITOR'S NOTE: THIS GROUP DID SOME MIGHTY GOOD EATING DURING MY 7-MONTH ABSENCE FROM PILGRIM!

JANUARY: Serbian food at **BEOGRAD CAFÉ** and deli market on West Irving Park Road was very much enjoyed by all diners. It is casual décor where we were seated in the back room, but were warmly greeted by a friendly waitress. Several of us ordered Serbian beer, while the rest enjoyed their wine. Kaymak is a creamy cheese spread for the round loaves of bread, which one pulls apart. Their menu consists mainly of several types of herb/spiced hamburgers and sausages, pork chops. They have a few chicken dishes and serve sandwiches and crepes also. The food is very tasty and filling, and service is very accommodating. It is reasonably priced for the amount of food and an 'old world' dining experience.

FEBRUARY: Our group enjoyed a delightful dinner at **ROYAL THAI**, 2209 West Montrose. Due to the frigid cold weather and other commitments, there were only five diners, but the conversation was easy, the place inviting and the food delicious. Chicken Satay was ordered for an appetizer, but when they served fried egg rolls instead, the group decided to go with the flow. Warm soups hit the spot. Dinners varied from chicken, pork, beef and crab, from rice to noodles, and from spicy hot to mild. Desserts included Thai custard and (believe it or not) coconut ice cream with sticky rice. Not a bite of dessert was left uneaten.

MARCH: On a wintery March Sunday, we traveled to Glenview for some Irish food at **THE CURRAGH** on Tower Road. It is typical Irish Pub with a large bar area and the back restaurant for larger parties. There are TV monitors for sports games on all walls. We were seated right away and given menus and water. Irish beers and wine were ordered along with bloody marys that had celery, pickles, olives, etc. The menu has many selections to choose from, but the most popular were fish & chips, Irish lamb stew, boxty corn beef & cabbage, which is wrapped up in a potato pancake, and curry chicken. The food is served in a timely manner and very tasty, with excellent friendly service. It is family friendly, but can get a bit noisy.

APRIL: It was a cold, rainy Sunday that we encountered the warmth of the **NOON-O-KABAB**, Persian restaurant on North Kedzie. The walls are decorated with colorful mosaic tiles. A friendly waitress showed us to our table. They do serve wine and beer, but a \$10 cork fee for BYOB. Diners are presented with plates of radishes, sliced onions, and soft feta cheese, which may be spread on the pita bread. They have a wide variety on the menu, kababs; chicken, steak, ground beef, lamb, and combinations plates; various wraps, and other chicken, meat, lamb and seafood dishes; most of them served with dill rice and very flavorful. The service was excellent and served in a timely manner. It is definitely a restaurant to check out.

MAY: On a muggy, warm Sunday, we all enjoyed a very unique dining experience at **JIBEK JOLU**, a Krygrystani restaurant 5047 North Lincoln Avenue. It is a rather small BYOB restaurant with colorful rug hangings on the wall, along with other very ornamental décor. Our table was reserved, as it was busy. The food is a very tasty combination of Russian, Chinese, Turkish and Afghan flavors. A shredded carrot salad was shared. Most of the dishes are meat or lamb and served with rice, dumplings or noodles and have their own spices and herbs with vegetables which are delicious. The waitress was very friendly and informative; excellent service with a smile. We all raved about and enjoyed the food and would go back for more and it's very reasonably priced.

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JUNE: Wow! Another great restaurant, Puerto Rican food was enjoyed at **COCINA BORICUA** on Fullerton Ave. by a dozen diners on a humid, hot Sunday. It is a small diner with atmosphere and décor right out of Puerto Rico; charming and the service as well. Our tables were ready and appetizers consisting of an assortment of empanadas, plantains and a beef filled encrusted mashed potato served with a garlic sauce was a real delicious treat. Chicken soup in a very lite tomato broth and noodles was served to all. Pork dishes with rice and black beans are a staple, but other dishes include chicken and beef, either fried or in a sauce with rice or a combination thereof. The food was served in a timely manner and very tasty. The owner/server was very friendly and helpful. It is BYOB and inexpressive. It is a real treat and family friendly. Another great find to put on your list.

JULY: On a perfect July evening the group enjoyed dining on the patio at **MASH** on Lincoln Avenue. In addition to hanging and potted flowers there was a huge colorful mural Chicago skyline painted on one wall. The restaurant features good burgers, with condiments and sides of choice as well as sandwiches and smoked pork and ribs. They have craft beers and wine. We ordered onions rings, which included a very spicy sauce for dipping. The service was friendly. It's a great place for neighborhood outdoor dining and for families too. On Sunday, August 16, we'll dine on the colorful flower patio at Adriatic Restaurant, 5553 North Clark. They have parking in the back.
