

Did you Know?

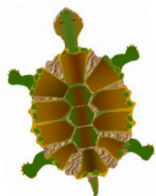
Since 2004, when the **IFLC** was formed, members have created and hosted five community-wide events for early learning and care professionals and families.

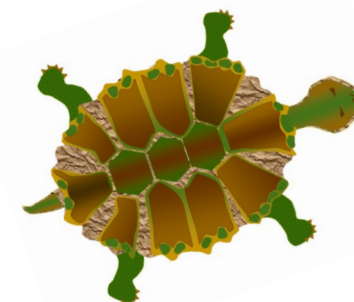

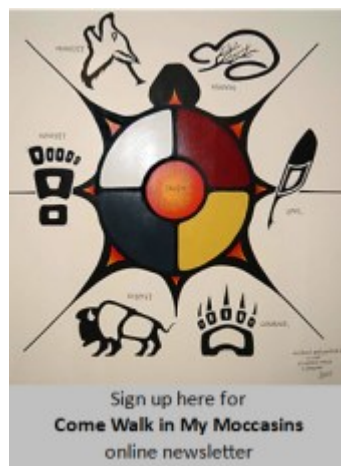
The Circle also receives guidance through the Community Health Indigenous Program and Indigenous Elders/Knowledge Keepers.

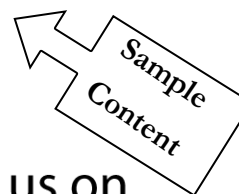
