

CHECKLIST FOR DELF A2

At French Speak, our team of teachers love to prepare our ambitious and motivated learners to get ready for the DELF exams. We have several decades of experience and pride ourselves in our very high success rate (average of 90% +).

We usually do this with weekly lessons one, two or three hours a week to cover all the topics and all the grammar needed for the specific exam level the learner wants to obtain.

Part 1: Listening aka "Compréhension orale"
Part 2: Reading aka "Compréhension écrite"
Part 3: Writing aka "Production écrite"
Part 4: Speaking aka "Production orale"

Level A2: Is this level for me?

<u>Listening level at A2</u> – The learner can:

• Hear and understand isolated phrases and frequently used phrases, in relation to immediate priority

- areas (e.g., simple personal and family information, shopping, close environment, work)
- Understand an exchange that involves the sharing of an impression, a feeling, a preference, agreement or disagreement, in simple terms
- Follow clear and specific instructions

<u>Reading level at A2</u> – The learner can:

- Read and understand isolated phrases and phrases frequently used in relation to immediate priority areas (e.g., simple personal and family information, near environment)
- Find a particular predictable piece of information in a common everyday document, a simple advertisement, a prospectus, an e-mail, etc.
- Understand the content of short and simple personal letters as a whole

<u>Writing level at A2</u> – The learner can:

- Write a structured personal message in response to a request, which relates to a situation close to their daily lives
- Write about events or activities experienced using a personal tone

<u>Speaking level at A2</u> – The learner can:

- Converse using phrases to describe their families and other people, their living conditions, their training and their current or past professional activity
- Situating events in time and telling past events
- Have brief exchanges
