

# **Connecting with the Deaf Community**







It is easy to get swept up into what is our personal normal and forget about others who live with a different normal than our own. As entrepreneurs and as speakers this often also holds true of our businesses as well because they are essentially an extension of our lived experiences. Very few entrepreneurs, small business owners, or speakers have a powerful compliance department behind them. There is no one to ask us the questions about things like accessibility, equity, and equality. For the most part it is up to us to research and discover how we can ensure that we are providing services that are inclusive.

To that point, as speakers and communicators, when was the last time you conducted an audit on your business, services, and marketing to assess your level of inclusivity? Are you fully connecting with vour audiences?

I had an opportunity to visit with D'yann Elaine, (pronounced De-Ann) the President and founder of "Sign with Me" to gain some perspective on some ways that we can ensure that our

information is inclusive and accessible to the deaf community.

DM: D'yann I appreciate you investing some time to educated us all on this important topic. Please let everyone know who you are and what you do?

**DE**: Alright, thank you. I am an American Sign Language educator and an ASL interpreter, accessible media producer, and new author. I am also an advocate and founder of "Sign with Me" which is a nonprofit organization which focuses on



bringing awareness to American Sign Language. We teach the fundamentals of American Sign Language in a fun and creative through music. We also advocate for equal communication access for those who are deaf and hard of hearing, as well as providing interpreter services. Our work connects both sides by raising awareness we help the hearing community

engage, interact and collaborate with the deaf community.

DM: As I listen to you speak. I notice you say specifically American Sign Language, so enlighten me and the readers on that.

**DE:** Good point. It's a myth and misnomer that American Sign Language is universal. It is not, and originally, I didn't know that either until I started taking my classes. Originally, I was just taking classes so I could get the skill I really wasn't pursuing being an interpreter. Interpreting came as a byproduct; my goal in the beginning was to be able to engage the deaf community and to be able to move in and out of the hearing world to the deaf world smoothly as a way to bridge us together. I learned in the program that American Sign Language represents America.

DM: If I understand correctly it sounds like ASL is a whole separate language. Does that mean every country has its own sign language?

**DE:** You're absolutely correct, ASL is its own separate language. It has its own grammar, its own structure, its own grammatical syntax, and features. Just like English, just like Spanish, just like Chinese or Japanese, whatever. Each country that has its own sign language system.

He will be made out to be an example for every Marine of Color. He will be pointed at as someone to look up to. Rightfully so.

Lt. Gen. Langley doesn't just get to be a "4-star general" he is the "First Black 4-Star General." There is a high degree of scrutiny that comes alone with being the "First Black" anything with high visibility. Remember "Tan-Gate." If you don't let me remind you, our "First Black President" Barak Obama wore a tan suit to a press conference to discuss increasing the military response against the Islamic State (ISIS) in Syria.
