IFLC met for the first time.

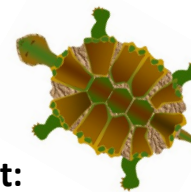
2005 - 2013

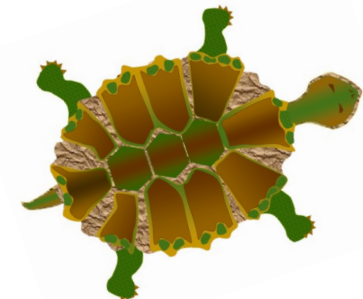

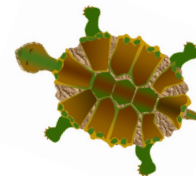
