

Top 10-public school. Highest ranked college in the Northeast. Ratings and rankings catch your eye and influence the college list. But how much *influence* should they play? When we follow up with the families we work with, the biggest factor for their student’s success was the right non-academic environment. Social, geographic, club/activities, alumni associations, and more played a key part in their student’s success.

What we’ve seen is that **a happy child is a successful child** and being happy in their environment allowed them to thrive at their college/university.

Step 1: Create a List

Sit down with your student and create a list of “non-academic” factors and what the ideal scenario would be for each. We’ve provided you with some of the most popular factors people consider.
